

CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

Catholic Social Teaching is something we all partake in and believe to be noble and worthy. It is focused on promotion of the common good and is something we seek to promote an understanding of in all at Cardinal Hume Catholic School. It is a way of living that has never been more relevant than it is today, as we seek to establish strong communities throughout the nation.



The origin of Catholic Social Teaching, comes firstly from the Bible, and in particular resonates with the teachings of Christ in the Gospels. It has been seen in the lives of the saints throughout the Catholic world over the ages, including, of course, our own wonderful Northern Saints. However, its first formal structure came about with the Rerum Novarum- "Of New Things" Encyclical Letter of Pope Leo XIII in 1891. This was written, post industrial revolution, as the gap between the rich few and the poverty of the masses could not be ignored. There have been a number of 'Social Encyclicals' since then, authored by a number of popes, that all carry the same essential theme. This being, that greatest respect should be held for all of us as God's creations; all actions are performed in promotion of the common good.

The common good is the complete development of all the people of the world. John XXIII describes it as, 'the sum total of conditions of social living, whereby persons are enabled more fully and readily to achieve their own perfection.' It is removed from the idea of the Utilitarian concept of the 'greatest good for the greatest number' as this lacks in care for those who are in the minority. It is also opposed to the idea of individualism, in which the individual's understanding of how they should live their life and what is morally acceptable, is all that counts. Once we enter this way of thinking, we are in danger of becoming an 'anything goes society'. One that lacks a moral compass: morality becomes a mere matter of opinion. To sum up the idea of the common good, we should ask ourselves simply one question: "What would those who are the neediest in this world say about how I lived my life?" If the answer is a positive one, then you have lived and acted in promotion of the common good. In addition, there is an understanding in modern times that can only be truly realized if we see ourselves as one global community.

At Cardinal Hume Catholic School, we seek to create an understanding of the importance of Catholic Social Teaching (CST) in all our young people. Taking briefly some of the key principles of CST, we seek to establish this understanding in the following ways:

Life and Dignity of the Human Person

We seek to establish an understanding in all our young people that all human creations are of God. As such each person we encounter in our school community and beyond should be valued as such. Also, through the Catholic belief in the 'Sanctity of Life,' we make our young people aware of the sacred quality of all life from conception to death.

Call to Family, Community and Participation

We seek to establish in our young people the importance of the family and how the family is the basic unit of our society. If we can create and support the understanding of the importance of family life, which of course is emphasized firstly in the homes of our young people, we are then nurturing strong community values and encouraging people not to step out of the community, which individualism can support, but rather to participate in community and build a strong society.

Rights and Responsibilities

We create awareness in our young people of their rights, the rights of all others as God's creations, as well as our responsibility to encourage and promote the human dignity of all. These rights connect with our overall duty to each other as a school community, to our families and to broader society.

Option for the Poor and Vulnerable

As stated clearly in the Parable of the Sheep and Goats, (Mt 25:31-46) we make our young people fully aware of our call as a Christian community to help those most in need. We do this through our fundraising and prayer-life, focusing specifically on those who are suffering most. As Christ states in this teaching, if we do not see those who are most in need as our first responsibility then we are not acting as God wants us to. This lies at the heart of the whole understanding of the common good.

The Dignity of Work and Rights of the Workers

We seek to create an understanding in our young people, by making them aware of the need to support companies that seek to benefit those from less economically developed nations in the best possible way. We also seek to create an understanding of how, once students leave school to enter broader society and the work place, that their work is valuable. We encourage them to recognize that they have a duty to doing their best for their employer, just as their employer has a duty of care for them.

Solidarity

We seek to create in our young people at Cardinal Hume Catholic School, an appreciation of the idea that there is only one race in this world - the human race. As such, we are all brothers and sisters in our small global community. All are treated with the greatest respect as all are God's creation.

Care for God's Creation

We show our respect for the Creator by our stewardship of creation. It is a requirement of our faith. We are called to protect people and the planet, living our faith in relationship with all of God's creation. This environmental challenge has fundamental moral and ethical dimensions that cannot be ignored. We seek to establish this thinking of responsibility in all at Cardinal Hume Catholic School.

So, in bringing this understanding to the young people at Cardinal Hume Catholic School, we are affirming their positive contribution to their school community and enabling them to continue with these strong values (gained through school and family) to build a better future society for all. CST is not political or ideological, but rather the inspirational foundation in which we build a just society that includes and values all equally, regardless of faith, race, gender or politics.

ASH WEDNESDAY- A TIME FOR TUNING IN

With the 5th of March upon us, we sat about thinking: What is the best way to engage young people in the importance and significance of Ash Wednesday, as well as the Lenten tradition in 2014?

No easy feat. But to put it across as a way of 'tuning into God' seemed an appropriate concept, and so, the invitations were laid out to the young people at Cardinal Hume Catholic School.

The service itself was organised by our chaplain, Jo Proctor, with the assistance of a number of committed, as well as, enthusiastic students and staff - a huge thank you to all involved. Also, a big thank you to both Father Walker and Deacon Tom for leading us into Lent.

Whether as young person or adult, our Lenten journey is always something that enriches our spiritual lives. It is, and should be a challenge. However, this challenge has the goal of 'tuning into God' at its heart. We are all busy people, whether young or old. No easy thing, but ultimately, that is the call of Christ at the heart of the Gospel. If we don't 'tune into' what God wants - and I hasten to

So we ask you all to keep our school community in prayer as we take our Lenten journey together and 'tune into' what God is asking of us all.

GATESHEAD DEANERY YOUTH GROUP ESTABLISHED

AT CARDINAL HUME CATHOLIC SCHOOL WE BELIEVE AN IMPORTANT AREA OF RESPONSIBILITY LIES IN ENABLING YOUNG PEOPLE TO CONTINUE WITH THEIR FAITH DEVELOPMENT BEYOND THE CONFINES OF THE SCHOOL DAY. ENCOURAGED BY THE SUPPORT OF EXECUTIVE HEADTEACHER NICK HURN AND EAST GATESHEAD DEANERY THIS IS SOMETHING A GROUP OF PARISHIONERS, CLERGY AND SCHOOL REPRESENTATIVES HAVE SOUGHT TO ESTABLISH.

After our brilliant Mission in 2011 it was clear from the deanery group involved in the preparation of this event, that we didn't want to stop with the Mission, surely there was something else we could do for the young people?

So it was decided, between deanery and school, that we should continue with the group post Mission and invite young people to join it: so establishing a 'Deanery Youth Group'. The idea was to invite young people interested in their spiritual development to come along to the meetings, express the direction they would like to go in their spiritual journey and then it would be up to the adults in the group both to facilitate and guide their vision in a practically encouraging way.

Of course many of the students involved were part of the excellent Confirmation evening we had in February 2013. However, there were also a number of students who regularly attend the excellent 'The Source' event. In casting our net this way we seek to forge links between school, deanery and diocese in the organisation of the youth group. This is not to say that the 'Gateshead Deanery Youth Group' is limited to just these students or students of Cardinal Hume Catholic School or indeed only Catholics. It is a group open to all young people of any faith background with the primary focus on the development of all young people in Gateshead who wish to delve deeper into their spiritual nature.


November 13th they organised their own input into the Youth Sunday celebration.

THE 'WORLD CHALLENGE' PROGRAMME WAS FOUNDED 26 YEARS AGO WITH THE INTENTION OF HELPING YOUNG PEOPLE DEVELOP CHARACTER, LEADERSHIP SKILLS, GLOBAL UNDERSTANDING AND THE IMPORTANCE OF HELPING THE LESS FORTUNATE. IT HAS PROVED A GREAT SUCCESS OVER THE YEARS AND CARDINAL HUME CATHOLIC SCHOOL IS TAKING THE OPPORTUNITY TO GET INVOLVED IN THIS FANTASTIC CHALLENGE.

A selection of keen and committed pupils from years 10-12 will be heading to Nepal with Mr Burrows, in July 2015, on an intrepid and challenging adventure. Once there, they will help a community by giving their time, strength, energy and good will to care for people in need.

All the students are very excited about the adventure, but it is not just a matter of waiting for July 2015 to arrive, jump on a plane and off we go. No – there is another part to the challenge! Each student is required to raise approximately £3000 each to partake in this opportunity. This is no paltry sum but with the good will and generosity of the local parishes and community, something that may just be manageable.

Students have already set themselves fundraising challenges such as: abseiling, running 25K, supermarket bag packing and connecting with their local parishes.

However, a huge thank you has to be given in particular to Father Patterson and all the parishioners of St Patrick's and St Alban's churches, whose breath-taking generosity saw students raise £1600 over one weekend – and that was even before the quiz night that raised a further £433, making a grand total of £2,130! A huge thank you to everyone in the parishes; your generosity has left students feeling truly humbled.

ETHICS MATTERS!



A gathering of philosophers

On the 14th February 2014, an intensive conference for students of Philosophy and Ethics for AS and A2 Religious Studies was held at Carmel College, Darlington. The college was delighted to have philosopher, theologian and author Peter Vardy, and his wife Charlotte Vardy delivering the conference for the second year.

AS and A2 Religious Studies students from both Year 12 and Year 13 attended the conference in order to develop further their knowledge on the topics they are studying.

Peter Vardy and his wife, Charlotte, brilliantly undertook the challenge of stimulating the intellect of sixth form students, engaging them in topics and bringing them on an intellectual journey that brought a depth and understanding beyond that of any textbook.

Engaging with the pupils, Dr Vardy lectured inspirationally and used resources, such as film clips, in order to give the pupils a different perspective. His wife gave an in depth overview on the history of art and links to ethical theories, allowing the students to discover where certain aspects of the theories developed from.

During the conference, Vardy engaged the individuals in debates and discussions which allowed us to conjure up our own opinions and ideas on the matters associated with the course. Our own River Francis brilliantly linked a Utilitarian understanding to the issue of whether drones should be used in modern warfare.

The day also gave us different perspectives relating to subjects we did not previously associate with the course; such as the inspiration behind different artists views, and companies like Google being involved

in developing technology that can be used in modern warfare.

Dr Vardy made each individual aware that through the Religious Studies course we gain a better understanding of the political issues that have led to major wars, relating to issues beyond those we find in the textbooks.

EASTER MESSAGE 2014

"This is my Body, which will be given for you" (Luke 22:19). Less than twenty-four hours had passed since Jesus had uttered those words. The apostles, silent witnesses to His execution, now understood their meaning. Christ's sacrifice which began in the Upper Room was completed on Calvary, when He shed every last drop of his Blood for the redemption of the world.

When Jesus died, an eclipse of the sun darkened the earth for three hours, while an earthquake devastated Jerusalem and Palestine. Across the valley and beyond the wall from Golgotha, the crossbeam of the great entrance to the sanctuary or "Holy Place" of the Temple cracked down the middle. The huge curtain hanging from it – a carpet in white, purple, blue and red – was "torn in two from top to bottom" (Mt 27:51). A brass gate of the inner Temple building, which normally required twenty men to move, swung open by itself. The central light of the candelabrum went out.

Jesus came to tell us that on the other side of death is eternal life for all who believe in Him. That life, He said, begins now, with a banquet which He hosts – the Eucharist. To be his disciples is to know with certainty that Jesus Christ is there for us, no matter what.

On behalf of the priests and deacons of our deanery, I warmly invite you and your family to experience through the dramatic Holy Week liturgies, from Passion Sunday through to Easter Sunday.

May the Easter peace of the Risen Lord be with your spirit.
