FROM PARISH TO PARTNERSHIP

IT WAS CARDINAL NEWMAN WHO SAID, "TO LIVE IS TO CHANGE, AND TO BE PERFECT IS TO HAVE CHANGED OFTEN." WE NOW FIND OURSELVES IN TIMES OF CHANGE BUT DESPITE THE GREAT WISDOM OF CARDINAL NEWMAN'S WORDS, NOT MANY OF US REALLY DO LIKE CHANGE.

Many of us like the routine of what we have become familiar with: the idea that there is no unexpected, only what we are used to, something we can consciously or subconsciously control on some level. This, of course, is understandable as it provides a sense of comfort, but sometimes changes are forced upon us and we must seek to move forward with them or risk losing great opportunities that would enable us all to build a great new future together. This is the dilemma we are now facing as a Church not only throughout our diocese but throughout the Western World. Thankfully, our diocese has not ignored the signs and in addressing the issue, launched the 'Forward Together In Hope' initiative.

It was at its official launch, at Cardinal Hume Catholic School over three years ago, that Bishop Seamus made clear how we needed to grasp the future as a Church united together:

"I am very aware of what is happening in our diocese. I'm also becoming aware that parish communities might indeed flourish if we become less 'parochial,' if we become more aware of our neighbours, more willing to work together and explore new possibilities."

The wisdom, at the centre of the 'Forward Together In Hope' programme, has encouraged us as a Catholic people to engage in the broader community change that lies ahead. This is foremost laid out in the new partnership structures that now exist. Our Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle is made up of 150 parishes. These 150 parishes are now gathered into 18 partnerships. Our partnership named 'John Ingram' after Blessed John Ingram, includes: Gateshead, Corpus Christi; Gateshead, Immaculate Heart of Mary; Pelaw, St Alban; Gateshead, St Anne; Felling, St Augustine; Gateshead, St Joseph; Whickham, St Mary; Gateshead, St Oswald; Felling, St Patrick; Gateshead, St Peter; Dunston, St Philip Neri; and Gateshead, St Wilfrid.

Blessed John Ingram, one of the 26 'Martyrs of the North,' John was born in 1565 and converted to Catholicism when studying at Oxford. He left England to study for the Priesthood and was ordained in Rome. Following his ordination, he spent some time in Europe before taking up his English mission. He arrived first in Scotland and was arrested crossing the Tweed, near Berwick.

He was sent then to Newcastle, on to York and eventually to the Tower of London, where he was grievously tortured.

Despite the painful inflictions and physical injuries, Blessed John Ingram refused to renounce his Catholic faith. He was eventually sent back North where he was executed in Gateshead on Friday, 26th July 1594, at a gallows near where the church of the Holy Trinity now stands in Gateshead town centre. He was only 29 years of age. His last words before being hung, drawn and quartered were: *"I take God and His Holy Angels to the record that I die only for the Holy Catholic Faith and Religion, and do rejoice and thank God with all my heart that He made me worthy to testify my faith therein by the spending of my blood in this manner."*

Each partnership has a Partnership Development Group (PDG) whose aim it is to encourage the good work being done by clergy and laity across the partnership and create a cohesive vision, which encourages and empowers a partnership identity. Each partnership is led by the Dean; our Partnership Dean is Father Paul Zilinski. Leading each PDG is the President, lay Chair and lay Vice Chair. The President of the PDG is the priest appointed to lead the partnership – in our case that is Father Paul Zilinski. Kate Wilkinson is our elected Chair and Alan Egdel our elected Vice Chair. The group also includes one member from a primary school within the partnership and one member from a secondary school within the partnership. They, along with the rest of both clergy and laity who are

part of the group, are responsible for the overall development of the partnership. The overall aim of the PDG is to create a forum that is genuinely representative of the clergy and laity in all of the parishes within the partnership.

After our first meeting, John Ingram Partnership, held a day of prayerful reflection and practical discussion at Minsteracres. The prayerful reflection was led by Father Joen, who reminded us not to forget the importance of times of waiting, a time we are in now, they are times that can bear great fruit if managed correctly. The important thing is not to rush. There will be a gradual evolution to the partnership-structure both within our own partnership group and across the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle. To compliment Father Joen's prayerful insight was the more practical approach of the equally insightful Diocesan Lay Leadership Coordinator – Amy Cameron.

Amy managed her part of the day by getting the group to think towards the **How?** we could implicate the new changes our partnership will require but made us first think about the **Why?** we were going to do this work. Both speakers helped the group bond together and gave them a focus for the upcoming challenges ahead. The time for us all to think seriously about how we develop within the new partnership model has arrived and it is very clear that all members of the PDG are committed to making it a success.

What has come out of the meetings so far is the need to move slowly and deliberately in order to build the best partnership model we can. It is very much focused on supporting all the good work currently being undertaken by a variety of groups within the partnership and using examples of good practice when and where appropriate. It is important that the partnership creates an awareness for all people in the parishes of what is going on throughout the partnership.

Everything from Mass times to Justice and Peace Groups. Things bode well for the future of John Ingram Partnership but, while we are never rushing, we must be fully aware that being proactive is key. We must not be waiting on a time when, due to declining numbers of clergy, one of our parishes is forced to close and people start to think and say, *"I never thought it would happen to us!"*

IN PROMOTION OF JUSTICE AND PEACE

In July, our Justice and Peace Group were delighted to host and be involved in many initiatives over their two 'Justice and Peace Awareness Days'. On the first day they hosted the excellent Young Christian Worker group led by Phil Callaghan and Marc Besford. The aim of the session was to highlight how we can promote Justice and Peace at a local level. Student responses were outstanding. Phil is giving up his presidency of the YCW, and now takes up the great calling of vocation and entering the priesthood. We pray that Phil's journey in this esteemed and noble calling is truly blessed. The second day had David Cross from CAFOD in school highlighting how we can promote Justice and Peace on a global level. This was another stimulating session which brought great responses from our students.

On both days there were also visits to a local foodbank which took what had been explained by YCW and CAFOD and put it into action:

"What does it profit, my brethren, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can faith save him? ¹⁵If a brother or sister is naked and destitute of daily food, ¹⁶and one of you says to them, 'Depart in peace, be warmed and filled,' but you do not give them the things which are needed for the body, what does it profit? ¹⁷Thus also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. (James 2:14-17)

There are a lot of unsung heroes that exist out in our local communities who do great work to support the most vulnerable in our society. It seems crazy to think that the 5th largest economy in the world needs foodbanks to ensure its citizens have enough food on which to live, but sadly that is the image that 21st

century Britain is currently reflecting. 1 in 5 people in the UK live below the poverty line. One group that step into help those most in need are volunteers at 'Gateshead Foodbank' seeded by Trussell Trust. The people behind the foodbank are an outstanding group of volunteers led by the wonderful Liz and Matty. It was Matty and Liz who had the idea to support those most in need by starting a foodbank. They began the journey in 2010, starting with a basically nothing more than a cupboard. As their good works gained support the council gave them a building to use in 2012, which is their current location in the Sands Industrial Estate, Swalwell, Gateshead.

After a health and safety briefing our students were then directed in placing packets of food/cans of food into various boxes for distribution. As we worked together promoting social justice it was wonderful to become aware of the ecumenical religious nature of the organisation. Matty and Liz are part of Kelvin Grove Church and while we were there, we met the Reverend Gilley from St Chad's in Gateshead who spoke

of the wonderful work of Gateshead Foodbank but also mentioned how all the foodbanks, such as Bensham Food Market, supported each other depending on the needs in the local area. Just as the Reverend left, another delivery arrived from St Mary's Catholic Church in Whickham. Then another from a non-religious community group committed to the promotion of social justice. It was a great witness to how all people in a community can come together in support of the common good. Our students were inspired by all the people they encountered.

On returning to school our students were invigorated by their experiences. They were then led in a reflective liturgy by the Chaplain on the importance of what they had witnessed over their two 'Justice and Peace Awareness Days' and the challenge now to take what they had learned with them, as they seek to promote Justice and Peace both in their school and local communities.

PHILIPPINES CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

In the Philippines, people love to celebrate Christmas for it is a symbol of love, forgiveness and new beginnings. It is one of the many reasons why Filipinos uphold their Christmas traditions as it is what makes their small celebration extra special.



Christmas lifts the spirits of those who celebrate it by sharing their happiness and blessings. One of the many Christmas traditions is 'Simbang Gabi' which translates as Midnight Mass. Many dedicated Christians wake up at dawn to attend church. This is part of a 9 day service which begins on December 16th and lasts until December 24th. It is a way of thanksgiving, worship and petition.

Additionally, Filipinos hang up parols in their homes to commemorate Christmas. Varying in colours, lights and design, it is a unique decoration made of bamboo and paper. The source of light comes from the candle and coconut lamp that is used to illuminate the star. Symbolising hope and guidance, the star indicates the Star of Bethlehem that guided the three wise men to the manger. In schools, children are taught how to make parols for an art showcase, which dates back to the 1300s

where people would hang parols outside their windows to display their work and 'outshine' their neighbours. This was encouraged by Spanish priests as a friendly competition to see who had the best parol.

More importantly, Christmas is an exciting time for children as it is a time for their voices to be heard loud and clear. Children would visit their neighbour's homes and sing Christmas songs in return for a small amount of money. Not only children but church organisations and clubs raise funds from carolling, spreading the Christmas spirit.



As important as spreading Christmas spirit, who can forget about food. A traditional Christmas food in the Philippines is 'Puto Bumbong' Vendors would sell this delicious delicacy outside the church after midnight mass as people make their way home.

This bite-size snack is made of steamed glutinous rice cooked in bamboo. Topped with butter and shredded coconut mixed with brown sugar, it is a cherished tradition in the Philippines.



As Christmas draws closer, many are looking forward to a new year full of new opportunities and endless blessings. Christmas brings families and friends closer to each other and to God as they are reminded of the whole purpose of Christmas: to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ.

IN PROMOTION OF THE COMMON GOOD - MALAWI

Our latest international link is based in Malawi, a small landlocked country in central Africa. The project, led by Miss Armstrong, began 18 months ago involving Tilananu orphanage and Chihame II CDSS School.

This exciting project helped broaden our students' understanding of the problem of poverty in under developed countries, it exposed them to cultural differences and brought them a greater understanding of how fundraising can change lives. In total we have raised over £3000 for Tilananu orphanage and Chihame School and we intend to keep fundraising in order to have maximum impact on the lives of children who desperately need our help. Miss Armstrong would like to take this opportunity to thank our staff and students for their overwhelming help with this project and to thank our parents at home who never fail to surprise us with their generosity and kindness. Miss Armstrong and Mr Burrows have recently returned from a trip of a lifetime in Malawi where they could experience first-hand, how our fundraising has changed the lives of the children at both the orphanage and Chihame School.



Partnership In Action

Miss Armstrong fundraised with a small group of students (The Justice and Peace group) to take a huge amount of school equipment: pens, pencils, rulers, rubbers and exercise books to give each individual student some stationary to help in their upcoming examinations. Cardinal Hume's partnership with Chihame school will only grow in strength and we intend to hold a host of other events to raise enough money to build a dormitory on the school's premises so that girls may find a secure place to complete their education without the risk of premature marriage or being disallowed from attending school due to their families financial situation. Please look out for updates on this new adventure in future newsletters.

Charity fundraising for Tilananu orphanage

Particular congratulations to our current year nine students, who last year managed to raise £2,500 on their 'Down With Devices' programme. Cardinal Hume School has raised the most money on this specific programme than any other school in the country. The students were sponsored from friends and family to give up all of their electronic devices for a whole weekend, to raise awareness of the lack of technology, electricity and communication in Malawi. This was a huge challenge for any young adult but our students approached this scheme with maturity and dogged determination. The money raised bought tables and chairs for Tilananu orphanage. Another congratulations must also go to our Sixth Form students who have co-ordinated a raffle and three cake sales which raised in total

£500 which also bought clothing for the young women at Tilananu orphanage. Whilst in Malawi Miss Armstrong and Mr Burrows visited the orphanage and were greeted with 20 girls aged between 3-19 who reside there on a permanent basis. They took great pleasure in drawing pictures for us (with the donated stationary we took with us) and are keen to maintain a strong link with our school.

A huge thank you to Nina Pulford (the founder of Tilananu orphanage) and Gayle Berry from Love, Support, Unite who have opened their hearts to the people of Malawi and worked tirelessly to create a better future for the children that they care for.

Connecting classroom partnership with Chihame II CDSS School

Funded by the British council under a Connecting Classrooms scheme, Miss Armstrong and Mr Burrows have liaised with Chihame II CDSS School for twelve months to share good teaching practise and experiences. They found a school which lacked all modern necessities for teaching, where the main resource for teachers were black boards and outdated textbooks. There were no toilets and no running water, and the students regularly did not eat for more than 24 hour periods. The generosity and smiles that greeted our group however, were truly overwhelming. The children at Chihame truly value the importance of an education. They see it as the only way to better their future prospects.



CHRISTMAS MESSAGE 2017

I wish you all a very happy and holy Christmas. For my message I wish simply to share with you a few reflections which Pope Benedict XVI made in his Book "Jesus of Nazareth, The Infancy Narratives."

The angels of the Lord appear to the shepherds and the glory of the Lord shines around them. They were filled with fear. But the angel takes away their fear and announces to them "a great joy, which will come to all people; for you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord."

The angels then sang, "Glory to God on high and on earth peace to men of good will." Here the angels seem to be indicating something is at stake: the relationship between God's grace and human freedom. Grace and freedom are thoroughly interwoven. It remains true that we could not love if we were not first loved by God. God's grace always precedes us, embraces us and carries us. But it also remains true that man is called to love in return, he does not remain an unwilling tool of God's omnipotence: he can love in return or he can refuse God's love.

The powerless child born in a Bethlehem cave and visited by poor shepherds is the start of another kind of kingdom which opens man up toward the true God. The peace of Jesus is a peace that the world cannot give. "When the angels went away from them, the shepherds had said to one another, 'Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known

to us.' And they went with haste, and found Mary and Joseph, and the babe lying in the manger." The significant words here are the shepherds **made haste**, partly no doubt from human curiosity, in order to see this great thing that had been announced to them. But surely, too, they were driven by their joy on hearing that now, truly, the Saviour, the Messiah, the Lord had been born, the one so long awaited – and they were the first to see him.

How many Christians **make haste** today, where the things of God are concerned? Surely, if anything merits haste – so the evangelist St Luke is discreetly telling us – then it is the things of God.

It is our hope and prayer as your priests that every one of you this year will **make haste** to your local church on Christmas Eve or on Christmas morning to celebrate the love and peace of God that is freely available for you, and also to give glory to God by your worship and participation in Christ's Mass.

Be assured that you will find a very warm welcome within your parish community. If you do respond positively to this invitation to join us for Mass, I promise you that you will experience for the rest of Christmas Season a deep joy, that you will find nowhere else, because it comes only from the Christ Child's love in our hearts. "Glory to God on high and on earth peace to men of good will."
